Five Design Principles That Matter

1. Placement before product.

Where a lift sits matters more than which lift you choose. The most successful designs consider sightlines, circulation, and how spaces are experienced day to day.

2. Align with architectural rhythm.

Doors, frames, and openings should align with existing proportions, ceiling lines, and joinery, not fight against them.

3. Material continuity.

Finishes should echo the surrounding palette, whether that is timber, stone, plaster, or paint. Contrast should feel intentional, not accidental.

4. Quiet operation.

A lift that looks good but announces itself through noise undermines the experience of the home.

5. Design for absence.

The lift should look just as considered when it is not in use as when it is. Closed doors, flush details, and concealed elements matter.

The best outcomes occur when lift planning happens alongside architectural and interior decisions, not after them. Early collaboration allows:

- Cleaner structural solutions
- Better spatial outcomes
- Reduced visual compromise
- An intentional feel, rather than retrofitted
